WELL RESPECTED SOLDIER AND OLD VICTORIAN – GOODBYE MY FRIEND

Corporal Nicholas Francis Kerr, a.k.a. Nicky, 30, residing at Jellalabad Barracks, Tidworth departed us on the evening of Tuesday 25th October 2011 while involved in a single car incident in Hurstbourne Priors, Hampshire. He was born on 1st May 1981 in Scunthorpe, North Lincolnshire.

Nicky endured a stereotypical military child's upbringing during his childhood before finding a more settled approach to life while attending Queen Victoria School (Q.V.S) during his adolescence. He would then develop into the well respected man that he was while serving as a Royal Electrical Mechanical Engineer (R.E.M.E) in the British Army.

During his time at Q.V.S. Nicky preferred to spend as little time as possible in the classroom, with academic stardom ranking relatively low on his list of priorities. Instead, he embraced a variety of extracurricular activities including: Athletics, Pipe Band Drumming, Rugby and Skiing. Nicky excelled in all that he participated in with some highlights including being a member of the 1st XV (or equivalent) rugby team during each of his school years, winning most 100m / 200m races that he entered, and being a member of the Pipe Band Drum Major trio that provided pre-match entertainment at Murrayfield. The list would go on...

"The beauty of being in the R.E.M.E is that you are moved around a lot and have the opportunity to meet so many different people." During his time in the R.E.M.E. Nicky was involved in operational tours in both Iraq and Afghanistan while also spending a considerable amount of time in Canada and Cyprus on exercise. He was promoted to Corporal in October 2009. While in Canada Nicky endured the Winter Rehabilitation Program where he was 2nd in charge of a very demanding Warrior Armored Vehicle Repair Line in which he excelled at. While in Cyprus Nicky was Section Commander for an Infantry based exercise called Lion Sun, which was also very demanding and again he excelled above his peers. Nicky was loved and well respected by so many people. He was one of the few people that everyone made an effort to stay in contact with. He has left a hole in the heart of everyone that had the pleasure to work with him. He has left a hole in the R.E.M.E.

There was time for one last swansong prior to his departure, which can be thought of as the 3-Peak Challenge "with a twist". In addition to climbing the 3 highest peaks in the UK, Nicky and his team members decided to add the "small" matter of cycling between mountains clocking up an impressive 450 miles. Nicky was very proud of this accomplishment and became incredibly overwhelmed after completing the final descent.

Nicky's personality was infectious. He was the life and soul of every party. He wore his heart on his sleeve and accepted slander like water off a duck's back. He served his country with pride and was one of life's great guys. Although he was in the prime of his adulthood, Nicky would have made a great husband and fantastic father. It's a real shame that he was unable to experience either. Nicky leaves behind a loving family, which continues to grow. I know they are very proud of the person that he has turned out to be

Nicky is survived by his father Frank, mother Sheila and sister Stacey. Other family members that will share in this tragic loss include: Grandfather Herschall, Brother-in-law Paul, Auntie Ann, Uncle John, Auntie Ellen, Uncle Graeme, Auntie Isobel, Uncle Scott and Cousins Alex, Ashleigh, Graeme, John, Justine, Kelly, Lauren and Leeann. Nicky is predeceased by his Grandmother Maureen, Grandfather Alexander and Grandmother Annie.

Nicky's farewell took place on Thursday 3rd November 2011 at the St. Theresa Roman Catholic Church, Possil Park and Maryhill Crematorium, Glasgow. This was followed by a celebration of his life at the local Territorial Army Centre during which Nicky's past and present lives were united as one.

People often say that you'll never have friends like the friends that you meet at University. Every officer, soldier and old Victorian would agree that you don't spend the best part of 10 years living in each other's pockets and not feel like family members. Nicky had an amazing heart and nobody will ever take that away from him.

"If we're lucky, an obituary will inspire the living to be good to their neighbours, strive for success and keep hope alive." I was very keen to get Vicki Harris (a keen OVA supporter & former Senior Monitor) to write a little about where she has ended since leaving the school and as one of the first to enter military service. Since leaving QV I took the tried and tested route of university before joining the RAF as a Weapons Systems Officer (Navigator). I graduated from Initial Officer Training 6 years ago and had my first front line job on the Nimrod MR2 carrying out the obligatory tours in the desert as well as getting some slightly more enjoyable ones in the Caribbean!! Supporting David Mcelhoney

You may not know but one of our OV's is a Foster Carer and is raising funds for the Fostering Network, During 2008 he raised £4,710 (Inca Trail Peru) and in 2010 he raised £6,125 (Great Wall China) - totaling £10,835 for the UK's leading charity working to improve standards of care for fostered children - some of which are forces children. David lives near the Catterick Garrison, North Yorkshire.

David says that the plan is for him to complete the Nepal Challenge during May 2012, by taking part in a thrilling 10-day trek and community project, against the magnificent backdrop of the Himalayas.

Those taking part will trek through mountain villages and thick rhododendron forests, see the peaks and glaciers of the Himalayas up close and be part of a community project for local children.

Before the group even starts up the first mountain the major challenge will be here at home, during these credit crunch times, trying to raise sponsorship from near and far. During times like this charities like the Fostering Network struggle just when more funds are actually needed to help make a difference to vulnerable children and young people.

There are 51,000 fostered children living with 43,000 foster families on any one day in the UK. The Fostering Network estimates there is a shortage of at least 10,000 foster families.

The Fostering Network is the UK's leading charity for all those involved in fostering, and exists to ensure that fostered children receive the highest standards of care. It has offices in Belfast, Cardiff, Glasgow and London.
